Metro Transit Bus Pass

Visiting the school

As partners in your child's education, we recognize the value and importance of working together. To this end, there are times when it is necessary to have an in-person meeting with a member of the admin team or with a staff member. We strongly suggest that you call ahead of time to set up an appointment to alleviate the possibility of an extended wait time should the admin team or other staff members that you wish to see not be readily available.

A reminder that all visitors to the school are required to check in at the main office at the Victoria Rd. Entrance. We also request parents/guardians to avoid coming into the parking lot on Victoria Rd., to drop off or pick up your child at the door. This avoids blocking the way of our Special Needs buses as they manoeuvre around cars. We need to take every necessary precaution to avoid accidents with students/staff or a collision with parked vehicles in the parking lot. Thanks in advance for your support and cooperation in the interest of keeping everyone safe.



SchoolCash Online

The HRCE online fee-paying system allows parents/guardians/students to make payments electronically for lockers, athletic fees, field trip costs etc. through SchoolCash Online. Chromebooks

We continue to make Chromebooks available to students to facilitate and enhance in-person learning in the classroom. We welcome back unreturned Chromebooks from last year, no questions asked! We prefer not to send out invoices for unreturned Chromebooks. A new Chromebook may not be issued to individuals who did not return their Chromebook last year even if they were in a different school. For this years Chromebook distribution, students are required to pick up a contract from the office which must be completed and signed by a parent/guardian. Upon receipt, your child will be assigned a Chromebook for the school year which must be returned at the end of the school year. Please note that online learning or at home remote learning is not permitted at this time.



Library books and Textbooks

We kindly are asking parents/guardians of students who attended Dartmouth High last year to help us by checking at home for library books, classroom novels and textbooks. If you find any of these items, we kindly ask that you send them to the school with your child. We are in dire need of these resources back in the school to prevent depletion. These materials can be dropped off at the office at anytime as soon as possible. Thank you in advance for your assistance.

Communication Protocol



We strongly encourage two-way communication with our school community. If you have a concern or a question about your child's assessments, evaluation or program of study, we ask that you make contact with the classroom teacher first. The classroom teacher is the main person and first line of communication in your child's education. Contact information for subject teachers is listed on your child's class schedule in Power School. The department head would be the next level of contact if you are not able to resolve the issue with the teacher. The school administration should be the last point of contact if issues stated above remain unresolved. Thank you in advance for respecting our communication protocol. We feel strongly that the key to resolving issues when they arise is to identify them early and take the necessary steps to find positive and timely solutions.

French Immersion (FI) students

To obtain the French Immersion certificate, students enrolled in the FI Program are required to take core courses offered in the French Immersion program to meet requirements for the FI Certificate and must take a minimum of nine (9) courses in French Language Instruction. We encourage students to plan ahead and put a lot of thought into the courses they will need to fulfil their post secondary requirements. FI students must work with their school counsellor to ensure that they are registered in the appropriate courses well in advance to avoid disappointments.

Please note that we will not be able to accommodate "Out of Area" FI students wanting to switch from the FI program to the English program at Dartmouth High. Students enrolled in the FI program who do not live within Dartmouth High's catchment area and wish to switch to the English program will be required to enrol in the English program in their neighbourhood school. Most often, the neighbourhood school is Woodlawn High School.

Student Engagement Guidelines

Students attending Dartmouth High are expected to be enrolled on a full-time basis. A student may be scheduled for a maximum of 8 credits in any academic year, however the minimum course load at each grade level for a full-time student is as follows:

Grade 10 - Eight courses yearlong (every other day)

Seven courses with full year Grade 10 Math Acad.

• Grade 11 - Seven courses – This may include some yearlong courses. (For semestered courses, generally, three courses one semester/four the next semester or vice versa)

· Grade 12 - Six courses (three each semester)

Students who do not follow the aforementioned required guidelines may not be eligible to participate in extracurricular activities. These guidelines serve to optimize student achievement and preparation for post-secondary options and opportunities.

Student Success Plan (SSP)

School goals:

Goal 1: To improve student achievement in math and literacy by strengthening communication, comprehension and interpretation skills.

Goal 2: To improve student achievement through continued development of skills related to social and emotional learning.

We are in year- 4 of our Student Success Plan as we continue to collaborate, discuss and explore strategies to meet the educational needs of our student population. Our leadership team (curriculum leaders) and the admin team with Math and Lang Arts dept. heads as co-chairs are planning to work closely to deliver targeted Professional Learning over the course of this school year. We are tasked with working together to analyze and employ assessment data with teachers in their respective departments to improve student learning. Of note, we were encouraged to have seen increases in math levels in Math 10 Academic having employed intentional strategies.

Guided by educational experts in professional learning sessions, we are implementing strategies to address social and emotional learning. We continue to work on expanding our knowledge base to support students through on going professional learning.

Student success and attendance

In the event, a student drops a course by refusing to attend the class or complete assigned work, the accumulated mark to that point may be reflected on the transcript as a final mark and may affect the student's overall average. This will also apply to students who are enrolled in courses but refuse to attend classes. We do not encourage students to drop courses in which they are enrolled as reducing course schedule may limit post-secondary options and may affect their ability to graduate on schedule. It is important to note that students risk losing a credit for a course in which they have missed 18 classes (20% of the course material).

Proactively, we keep a close eye on students' attendance and will have regular conversations with students and parents so we are all on the same page. If students are disengaged, we encourage students and parents to bring this to the attention of the school. We also encourage self-advocacy on the part of the students to articulate their learning needs as academic supports are available.
